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Letter from the Artistic Director

Perhaps the most remarkable thing about this moment in American history is that we are truly reckoning with the ways in which our country and institutions serve not just the hegemony, but every group in the melting pot/salad bowl that makes up our great country. In addition to our outstanding artistic programming in 2019, the Hangar is proud of its efforts to lead the way in creating an American theatre that honors inclusivity, diversity and equity.

Our Mainstage season, which included four full productions, the *Big Play Festival!*, and *Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol* in the winter, saw an increase in ticket sales of over 2,000 seats. *Kinky Boots* was the stand-out, with over 4,400 single tickets sold for that production alone. *Big Play Festival!* also outsold its budgeted goal by 40%. By the end of Early Bird subscription sales in October 2019 we had already surpassed our subscription numbers for December of the previous year, and we are hopeful to surpass our 2019

Mainstage summer subscription numbers. This level of growth is demonstrative of the artistic vitality of Hangar Theatre, and would not be possible without the full support of our Board, staff, artists, donors, and audiences, to which we are infinitely grateful. I am perhaps most proud of our success in color conscious casting in all of our Mainstage productions, which featured twice as many people of color as the national average.

In 2019, as an addition to our new mission statement, the Hangar Theatre Company instituted a list of core values which include equality, diversity, and inclusion. We demonstrated our commitment to upholding these values through a season of theatre that featured inclusivity. The Hangar's 2019 Mainstage season celebrated LGBTQIA characters and themes to honor the 50th anniversary of the Stonewall riots and the Pride celebrations following that historic event. The season opened with Liz Duffy Adams' contemporary pansexual take on restoration comedy *Or, What She Will.* Two musicals followed: *Into The Woods*, cast with 50% people of color, and the regional premiere of *Kinky Boots*, which celebrated queer culture in the manifestation of Lola, a black drag queen and changemaker, featuring a book and score by LGBTQIA icons Harvey Fierstein and Cyndi Lauper, respectively. Next was an adaptation of *Little Women* by playwright Kate Hamill, who re-imagined Jo as a trans character stuck in a society incapable of accepting him.

The summer Mainstage season closed with an innovative series entitled the *Big Play Festival!*: staged readings of three classic plays with large casts, all centered on the theme of the American family. *You Can't Take It With You, A Raisin In The Sun,* and *August: Osage County* were cast almost entirely with actors living in the Ithaca area. Hangar patrons received the festival format and staged reading experience with great enthusiasm, and we are exploring variations for our 2021 season.

Our Wedge series was presented in The Cherry Artspace for the third year in a row, deepening our relationship with Ithaca newest theatre company, The Cherry Arts. They also served as the Associate Sponsor on the *Big Play Festival!* and the Drama League, which selects the four directing fellows who act as the artistic leadership of our Lab Company. In 2019, the Wedge presented *Revolt. She Said. Revolt Again* by Alice Birch, *The Revolutionists* by Lauren Gunderson, *The War Boys* by Naomi Wallace, and *The Thing I Hold* by Harrison David Rivers. All had strong performances and highly original staging. We are thrilled to be continuing our partnership with The Cherry Arts and the Drama League for 2020 in the reimagined form of a four-play repertory festival.

The Artist in Residency Series (AIRS) continued for its third year, granting artists a five-day residency to work on a project of their choosing, including the space and resources to create without distractions. The residency culminates in an event at which the artist presents excerpts of their work to Hangar Board, staff, and community members interested in gaining a deeper understanding of their process. We have received glowing feedback regarding this program, and anticipate another year of dynamic new works in 2020.

We look forward in anticipation of our exciting 2020 season, with two large musicals, two fantastic plays performing concurrently, a community works project featuring over 30 Tompkins County residents, and a brand-new winter show to revitalize our audience's holiday traditions.

Letter from the Managing Director

My 2019 Annual Report missive will be short and sweet. It was a year of transitions—some anticipated, some unexpected. As Managing Director, I actively encourage us all to "keep the drama on the stage." And so we have, and so we do.

In his letter, Michael waxes eloquent about the artistic product and corresponding financials this year. I am so proud of the experiments we tried after canvassing several long-time subscribers. We offered two musicals back-to-back in mid-summer, when Ithaca welcomes its greatest number of visitors, and closed the summer season with the *Big Play Festival!*, which allowed us to cast so many of the talented actors in our community.

Many in that theatre family were with us earlier in the year, when we gathered to celebrate our sister, Camilla Shade, a teaching artist at the Hangar for 16 years whose warmth, originality, and love of life blessed all who knew her. In a brief return to acting several years ago, I played Camilla's sister in a short play by Kathy Kramer, directed by Kit Wainer, an experience I will always cherish.

I began 2019 fully intending to live out my contract until March 2021, but many factors led to the decision to retire in spring 2020. It was not an easy decision, but a necessary one. I look forward to my daughter's wedding, to visiting my 93-year-old mother in Ohio and other family more frequently, and to making more music with the Dorothy Cotton Jubilee Singers and with my banjo and guitar maestro husband-there's such a lot of early music repertoire for harpsichord and guitar! Interesting projects have a way of finding their way to me, too; we'll see what comes along.

Like Mary Poppins, I came with a bag and a few tricks to help a beloved institution; while I might have a few tricks left, this bag is depleted and it's time to go. The Hangar is in excellent hands with a dedicated staff, revitalized Board, and my co-leader Artistic Director Michael Barakiva to see it into the future.

And so, this is really a thank-you letter-to the Board, the staff, and especially to Michael, for believing in me and giving me that "one more big job"-onward!

Shirley Serotsky

"After many years working as a teaching artist, and learning from some wonderful education directors and teaching mentors myself, I'm thrilled to bring those experiences to a leadership role at the Hangar, and to continue to strengthen and expand our educational offerings. I believe deeply that arts education exists not only to prepare the next generation of career artists, but also to unleash creativity in all young people, and to help nurture the next generation of empathic, thoughtful human beings."

In 2019, the Hangar Theatre named Shirley Serotsky Associate Artistic Director and Education Director. She succeeded Nathan Norcross, who served as Associate Artistic Director and Education Director since July 2017.

Shirley Serotsky is a theatre director, dramaturg, educator, and producer who has held leadership and educational positions while conducting an active freelance directing career in Washington, DC. She has most recently served as staff dramaturg and public programmer for Mosaic Theater Company, and as a co-director of the Director's Intensive for the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival.

Between 2008 and 2016 she served in a series of leadership positions (including interim artistic director for the 2015-2016 season) at Theater J, a professional theatre company producing timely new plays and revivals. Previous to that, she served as the new works coordinator for Catalyst Theatre Company and was a founding member and producer for Bouncing Ball Theatrical Productions.

Selected directing credits include: *The How and the Why, Another Way Home, The Call, Yentl, The Argument, The Hampton Years, Mikveh* (which received two Helen Hayes Nominations for Best Actress), and *The Rise and Fall of Annie Hall* (which received a 2009 Helen Hayes Nomination for Best New Play) (Theater J); *Rapture, Blister, Burn* (which received a Helen Hayes Award for Best Supporting Actress) (Round House Theatre); *Winnie the Pooh* and *The Jungle Book* (Adventure Theatre); *God of Carnage, Other Life Forms,* and *Working: The Musical* (Keegan Theatre); and *Blood Wedding* (Constellation Theatre), among others.

"Shirley impressed us with her poise, experience, intelligence, and ease," said Artistic Director Michael Barakiva. "We are truly fortunate to have her join the Hangar family and Ithaca community."

Serotsky holds an MFA in directing and theatrical production from Catholic University in Washington, DC and a BFA in drama and directing from the University of North Carolina School of the Arts in Winston-Salem, NC. She also studied musical theatre at the University of Michigan.

A native of Rochester, NY, Shirley was a member of the Hangar Lab Company the summer after her freshman year of college, an experience she calls "lifeand career-shifting, in many wonderful ways."

EDUCATION AND TRAINING PROGRAMS

EDUCATION

In 2019, there were 146 registered students for the Next Generation School of Theatre, which resulted in a 37% increase in tuition revenue compared to 2017. We provided \$6,475 in Next Generation scholarships to students in the program.

Along with professional training in the summer, Hangar offers nine-month production internships for Stage/ Production Management and Lighting Design/Electrics. In 2019, a new position was created for an Artistic Administration Fellow.

PROFESSIONAL TRAINING

Drama League Directors Project: The Hangar Directing Fellowship is an intensive practicum in the artistic life of a regional theater. Designed to hone leadership skills and creative abilities within an institution, the Fellows serve as artistic leaders of the Lab Company for the summer season at the Hangar Theatre throughout the fellowship experience.

The Hangar Theatre remembers **Camilla Sabine Schade** (May 2, 1952-May 24, 2019) and her incredible legacy in the Ithaca community.

> In 2004, Camilla moved to New York State and began a new life in Cayutaville. She soon began working with the Hangar Theatre's Project 4 in nearby Ithaca which puts artists in 4th grade classrooms to create plays with students and teachers. Camilla's enthusiasm was infectious and she delighted in introducing stagecraft to her young charges, especially the shy ones. Other theater teaching work included Ithaca Youth Bureau, Hangar Theatre summer programs, after school workshops, Big Brothers Big Sisters, and 171 Cedar Arts in Corning NY. Her favorite teaching work was writing and performing plays with adults with disabilities for Pathways, Inc. in Corning.

Camilla worked with the Ithaca theater community onstage at the Hangar Theatre, Kitchen Theatre, Cinemapolis, Cherry Arts and Homecoming Players. She performed in many short plays, staged readings, radio voiceovers, and public events. She did narration for Music's Recreation and the Grass Roots Orchestra. She charmed audiences with her character Mabel McClafferty at the Cancer Resource Center's annual fundraiser, "One Funny Ithaca." She even played Einstein at Cornell University.

Camilla's warmth and sincere interest in others' lives made human interactions possible that were not ordinary. She would routinely light up a room with her smile and energy. One felt that they were a better person when Camilla was nearby.

On August 26, 2019, the Hangar Theatre celebrated the life and work of Camilla in an open mic, designed for the community to speak, sing, read, or share stories of Camilla, and perform excerpts from her expansive repertoire.

SECOND ANNUAL SENSORY SENSITIVE PERFORMANCE

On July 12, 2019, the Hangar Theatre presented a special free performance of *Jack and the Beanstalk* for children with higher sensory sensitivity. To prepare, crew and cast attended a workshop by special education teacher Renee Zonder on how to best meet the audience's needs. The free performance was made possible by an anonymous donation, and thanks to a recent grant, the Hangar now has a lending library of sensory sensitive resources, such as fidgets and noise-cancelling headphones, which can be signed out before any future performance. The Hangar is part of a growing national movement to make theatre accessible to sensory sensitive children.

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


